

## Secretary's Report

#### **Board Meeting Minutes, January 2, 2018**

Attendees: Sharon Amann, Ron and Susan Stow, Chuck and Jean Draheim, Dianne Anderson, Pat Carlson, Dave and Mary Beth Mutchler.

- We reviewed the Julebord. There were serious problems: too many people do not bring their item. Some don't even pay the \$10; others do but it still leaves us short of food due to no advanced notice. Also, the early people through the appetizer line take more than their share of available food, leaving little to none for those who come later. This results in those in the kitchen (who have contributed the most but are served last) to receive no appetizers at all. We discussed many alternatives, including just cancelling the whole thing or having the Julebord catered with a much higher price, but didn't come to a conclusion, eventually tabling the discussion due to time constraints.
- Dave gave his resignation as Secretary as of the end of the year. He will help his replacement to come up to speed as soon as they are identified; it would be good to have someone not presently on the Board. Ron suggested that we may want two people: one as a Recording Secretary and one as an Executive Secretary. We are all to look for candidates; any of our members are encouraged to indicate their interest in at least learning more about either position.
- Naomi was unable to attend, so we postponed our discussion of future programs except for February. Naomi proposed that we play bingo, and asked for \$50 for prizes. A motion (Chuck/Jean) to do this passed unanimously. We agreed that the bingo squares will be announced in both English and Norwegian, with the language used first to alternate, giving those who now the Norwegian words a slight advantage. We'll ask Sheryl Hove if she can announce squares, with Susan as her backup.
- We again discussed the cost of sending paper copies of our newsletter to members without email addresses. We are going to ask for \$10 to defer costs. Dave will send the mailing list to Ron for evaluation.
- Although absent, Sasha had sent an excellent proposal to redo our post-Secondary scholarship program. Overall, we agreed with what was said, with the stipulation (suggested by Chuck) that the conditional verbs be replaced with definitive alternatives (eg.: "should" becomes "must"). Then it's set to go on our

- We still need alternates for the June District 1 Convention from our lodge membership at large. Susan has several candidates ready for resolutions. Jean suggested that we find out the deadline to submit resolutions.
- The next board of directors meeting will be held at 7:00 PM on Tuesday, February 6 in the Board Room at the Maplewood library.

#### Lodge Meeting on January 9, 2018

- 43 Members and guests attended our lodge meeting, with our only guest being Gina Pockrandt, our Zone 9 Director. Gina was present to install our lodge officers for 2018.
- We sang the anthems and did the pledge of allegiance, with a couple of changes from the past. We welcome our new musician, Norma Erickson, and the song lyrics were shown on the screen rather than by song book.
- Gina installed the officers after giving a plug for the upcoming District 1 Convention in June in Rochester MN.
- The December meeting minutes were approved as printed in the newsletter.
- There was a sign-up sheet for the Chili Dump to be held in February. Susan Stow asked that everyone bring an afghan or shawl to add to the feeling of hygge at this meeting, at which Bingo will also be played.
- Scholarship Director Sasha Aslanian introduced the group to our new scholarships. The College Scholarship has been replaced by a Post-Secondary Scholarship including both college and trade studies, and there is a new Nordic Experiences Fund which is open to adult members for many learning experiences. See the website for the details. Both applications are due March 15 to Sasha.
- Sasha also announced the gift of "The Devil's Wedding Ring" to the library. It was donated by her mother, and is one of the books mentioned in our evening program.
- We celebrated the January birthday of Harry Thomsen, and the January anniversary of Jacqui Carlone. Jen Stow won the door prize.
- Lowell Johnson, our Sports Director, had bronze, silver, and gold walking medals for Cathie Reasoner, who walked more than 630 miles this year (much of it in Europe). Naomi Hagen had a pin for Dianne Anderson for Part 2 of the reading award. Dianne read 5 books and interpreted three poems for this award. Dianne announced the start of a 4-month book club, which will meet during coffee at the end of our meetings during February through May.
- Naomi then introduced the speakers at our program, which featured book reports by members who had recently read Scandinavian books.
  - Axel Torvi spoke on "To Siberia" by Per Petterson (who wrote "Out Stealing Horses"). It is a pre-WWII novel about a brother and sister whose fantasies are recounted through recollections of the sister in her later years.
  - Ken Bjork reported on "The Devil's Wedding Ring" by Vidar Sundstøl, which is a mystery by another of the Swedish Mystery writers. The plot involves two disappearances regarding pagan rituals. Ken liked the book and also mentioned the "Minnesota Trilogy" by the same author, dealing with Lake Superior settings.

## Scandinavian Culture

# The Lyngen Line by Don Halvorson

East of the North Norway city of Tromsø, in the fykle of Troms, lie the Lyngen Alps. Following the western shore of the Lyngenfjord in a north-south direction, this alpine mountain range covers an area 56 miles long and 9-12 miles wide.

The mountain range is part of the Lyngen Peninsula, encompassing spectacular alpine scenery of blue glaciers, rushing glacial rivers and high peaks with deep ravines. With mountains rising as high as over 6,000 feet, they are the last natural barrier between Norway and its arctic neighbor, Russia.

During the last days of October 1944, the Lyngenfjord became a battleground between the 200,000 retreating German forces and the pursuing Russian 14<sup>th</sup> Army. As the Germans fell back, they had orders from Berlin to destroy everything in their path that would aid the approaching Russian troops. In a last desperate line of defense, they made the decision to build hundreds of bunkers in line with the Lyngen Alps. To build these bunkers, they used slave labor, hundreds of captured Russian, Yugoslav and Polish soldiers, to do the majority of the heavy work. Many died of starvation and fatigue while carrying heavy equipment, guns and ammunition up the steep mountainsides. Those who survived were put to work building crude bunkers, constructed of heavy stones and boulders to hold the German guns in place.

Once the British heard of the Russian offensive, they immediately ordered the deployment of Norwegian Free Forces to the area to cut off the retreat.

Soon after the liberation of Norway, with the beginning of the cold war, the dynamic of Europe changed dramatically. Norway, with the Soviet Union on its northern border, chose to cast her fate with





the new NATO alliance in 1949. By 1951, Norwegian Defense Forces had a strategic plan in mind. Ironically, their plan was much the same as the German bunker system erected in 1944. A series of nearly 300 bunkers were created in a line running south of the Lyngenfjord and north to the Swedish border. Dozens of coastal forts were also built, from Harstad on the west coast, to the eastern side of the Lyngen Alps. Protecting the eastern face of the Alps, the Norwegians constructed Arøybukt Fort on the coast, between 1953 and 1957. On the western side near Tromsø, they built nine forts, the largest, Breivknes, was finished in 1954. Both fortifications were equipped with long-range 75 millimeter guns, meant to stop any sea born assaults attempting to reach the fjords on either side of the Alps.

With the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991, and the development of new warfare technology, many of the installations became obsolete. Breiviknes and Arøbukt near Tromsø were decommissioned and sold in 2000. Some were retained and are now used for training purposes. Even though the Russian threat is currently less apparent, the geographic reality continues to remain in the collective Norwegian mind.
