

Dear Fellow Lodge Members,

Lynn Hoffmeyer sent me a message with an excellent suggestion to send out an e-blast checking on the welfare of all of our members. After consulting with the Brevet editor, we decided to include this with the April Brevet. How are you all doing? Are any of you unlucky enough to have contracted COVID-19 or any other little nasties? Are any of you in need of any kind of assistance? Sons of Norway began as a fraternal organization to assist Norwegian immigrants in their times of need, and this is still true today.

Please reach out if you are in need of assistance, and we will try to find someone who can help you. Nearly all of our members are in the "high risk" category because of age or underlying conditions, so meeting some requests may not be possible. Person to person contacts should be avoided at all cost.

If you need groceries picked up at your local store, we can possibly arrange this but only if you can order and pay online, and we can pick up at your store without having to actually enter the store. Festival Foods is currently not taking any new clients for curbside pick-up or delivery, but Cub Foods is. I haven't checked other grocery chains to find out what their policies are.

If you know of a lodge member who does not have internet access, give them a call and check on them. Sometimes just a friendly voice on the other end of the line is enough to boost someone's spirits.

The International Lodge has cancelled the 2020 International Convention and, by extension, cancelled all district conventions. Sons of Norway is not alone in cancelling these large gatherings. Lions International has cancelled their 2020 convention, and the IOC has postponed the Olympic Games for one year. The International Institute of Minnesota has cancelled the 2020 Festival of Nations. This is the first time since its inception 88 years ago that the Festival has been cancelled.

Governor Tim Walz has ordered/requested that all Minnesotans stay home and only venture out if absolutely necessary. We should all respect this request!

Your lodge board of directors is monitoring the ever-changing situation. Our April board meeting will take place via teleconferencing. We will be making some very tough decisions about future lodge events. We will keep you posted as the need arises. **ALL LODGE EVENTS ARE CANCELLED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE.**

We are a strong people, and we will get through this health crisis.

Hallo Synnove-Nordkap members. As a member of the District 1 Board of Directors I would like to share some information with you about the status of this year's district convention. As you may already know from previous announcements, the 2020 District 1 Convention was scheduled to take place June 4-6 at Cragun's Resort Conference Center at Brainerd MN. Unfortunately, the convention has been cancelled. At this time, the next district convention is scheduled to be held in 2022.

Here is a look, though, at what happens at a district convention. Our lodge sends and pays the registration/ hotel for four delegates to the convention. They attend business meetings where resolutions are presented and discussed. Break-out sessions present a variety of topics about Sons of Norway and Norwegian culture to enrich their knowledge of these subjects. One benefit of conventions is that attendees meet members of other lodges throughout the district, which stretches from Minnesota to Texas. They exchange ideas about programs, membership recruitment, and other topics concerning the success of individual lodges. Most of the time, conventioneers realize they are all in the same boat, and it is essential that they make a cooperative effort to keep it afloat.

President Chuck Draheim called the meeting to order.

- 1. <u>SECRETARY'S REPORT</u>: Approved as printed in the Brevet.
- 2. <u>TREASURER'S REPORT JEAN</u>: Approved as presented; D17 annual audit has been completed. 990N electronic filing for tax exemption will be completed soon.
- COMMITTEE REPORTS:

 - b. Foundation Susan: Nothing to report
 - c. Brevet/Web site Ingrid: Lodge calendar is now on the website. The g-mail address forwarding mail directly to the lodge president is active. There is a Festival of Nations link for volunteer sign-ups on the website. Asks for member thoughts on outreach to members in senior living apartments and are no longer able to regularly attend meetings.
 - d. District 1 Ron: The spring Board meeting will be April 24-25. It will decide the script for the district convention.
 - e. Cultural Director Ron: As small groups take turns outside looking through Mike Lynch's telescope, we'll serve Nordic Waffles and socialize.

Scandinavian Culture

Bjørn West

In late 1944, with the war turning against the Germans on both fronts, the British and Norwegian High Command in London encountered new concerns. German troops in Norway, ordered back to the continent, would likely destroy essential Norwegian installations. Some military planners also considered Norway another possible Allied invasion site. The number of resistance fighters in Norway was far too small to be effective. A decision was made to create a new fighting force. Small groups of well-trained, wellsupplied troops could be dropped into remote areas of Norway, and stay hidden until needed. Their mission was to protect those installations and be ready to help invading allied forces when that time arrived. Once established, supplies would reach them from the sea or by air. If they were to come under attack, they were to retreat deeper into the mountains or await evacuation by sea.

Bjørn (Bear) West, one of six SOE trained bases set up by Milorg, was located in the Matre

mountains 40 miles northeast of Bergen. Biorn East base was set up in the Voss-Hardanger area. Elg (Elk) base was located in Buskerud. northwest of Oslo. Varg (Wolf) base was in Vest-Agder west of Stavanger. Orm (Snake) base was located near the

Swedish border in Hamar. Hjort (Stag) base, also on the Swedish border, was east of Trondheim.

Of those six bases, only Bjørn West was documented in Inside Fortress Norway, by Thomas Nielsen, a resistance fighter and member of Bjørn West. The base was only in operation for the last six months of the war. Its initial plan was to assemble and train 1,200 men. That number dwindled to 500, then because of further



issues with the war, was reduced to 255 men. Commanded by former Linge Company officer, Captain Harald Risnes, some of the troops had fought the Germans before the Norwegian surrender. Others were recruits, fleeing the latest roundup of young people destined for the German army or a labor camp in Germany.

Life at Bjørn West was a repetitive routine: training followed by more training and ski patrols, constantly watching the mountains for Germans. Meanwhile they waited for new instructions from London. Retrieving new supplies was difficult. Airdrops were often hampered by changing winter weather conditions in western Norway. Troops fighting the German counter-offensive in France and Belgium had first priority. Supplies arriving from the boats in Shetland became more reliable but were more challenging to retrieve. Timed to arrive in the dead of night, the Shetland supplies would arrive by boat off the mouth of the Fensfjord. They were then transferred to fishing boats and carried to the village of Andvik. Again at night, they were taken by horse and cart to the isolated Matinus farm in Nordlandsdalen. Finally they were slowly carried on the backs of soldiers up a grueling mountain trail to the base camp.

Then, on April 27th, 1945 the war came to Biørn West. German forces, accompanied by warships, landed at Metre. On the 28th a small German force attacked the Bjørn West base at Fossestøllen and was repelled by a larger force of Norwegians dug in here. Between April 29th and May 1st, hard fighting continued at Kringlebotn. Litlematrestølen and Krokavatnet north of Stordalen. In all these battles, Norwegian losses were far fewer than the Germans. At the same time these battles were being fought, negotiations had begun transpiring between London and German occupation

> forces in Norway. On May 2^{nd,} Bjørn West was order to stand down. On May 3rd, ß German troops were also ordered to stand down. Once they were evacuated from the Bjorn West base, these troops were shipped to Bergen to control the German troop evacuation from Norway.
