


Welcome to a New Year! Tuesday, January 9, 6:00 PM

Synnøve-Nordkap will begin 2024 with a new format for the monthly member meetings. We are excited to begin serving a light supper for \$5 per person (cash can be paid upon arrival). On Tuesday, January 9, chili & accompaniments will be available at 6:00 PM. The member meeting will begin at **6:45 PM** with our guest speaker David Jones. A brief business meeting, including singing of national anthems, installation of officers, and announcements, will follow. Coffee and a light dessert will be available for all.

David Jones will present a program titled, "Prohibition: A Grand Misadventure." Andrew J. Volstead, U.S. Representative from Minnesota's 7th Congressional District and chair of the Judiciary Committee, sponsored the bill in Congress and lent his name to the informal "name" of the act: the Volstead Act. Many Norwegians were highly supportive and Norwegian women had a large membership in the Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

David Jones is a resident of Minneapolis and a native of St. Peter, MN. He graduated from Gustavus Adolphus College and spent 24 years in the financial services industry and three years in the nonprofit sector. He has been making presentations since 1996 and has spoken more than 2,000 times to a total of more than 50,000 people!

Famous Norwegians: Mari Boine

Mari Boine is a Norwegian Sámi singer. She combines traditional Sámi Joik singing with rock. Rootsworld, who interviewed Boine in 2002, described her as "an unofficial Sámi cultural ambassador". She was born and raised in Gámehisnjárga, a village on the river Anarjohka in Norway. Boine's parents were Sámi who made their living from fishing and farming. As Boine grew up, she started to rebel against the prejudiced attitude of being an inferior "Lappish" woman in Norwegian society. Boine's songs are strongly rooted in her experience of being in a despised minority, but



some of Boine's other songs are more positive, often singing of the beauty and wildness of Sápmi, the Sámi lands of northern Scandinavia. Boine sings in an adaptation of traditional Sámi style, using the "Joik" voice, with a range of accompanying instruments and percussion from indigenous traditions from around the world. In 1993, Boine became the first recipient of the Áillohaš Music Award, a Sámi music award conferred by the municipality of Kautokeino and the Kautokeino Sámi

Association to honor the significant contributions the recipient or recipients has made to the diverse world of Sámi music. She was appointed knight, first class in the Royal Norwegian Order of St. Olav for her artistic diversity in 2009. In 2012, Boine was appointed as a "statsstipendiat", which is an artist with national funding, the highest honor that can be bestowed upon any artist in Norway.

Nobel Prize-Winning Author Jon Fosse



In Stockholm, in 2023, the Nobel Prize in Literature was awarded to 64-year old Jon Olav Fosse, a contemporary author and dramatist from Bergen, Norway. Nearly a century later, he joins three other Norwegians who have won this award: Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson in 1903, Knut Hamsun in 1923, and Sigrid Undset in 1928.

Fosse's unique style of writing is described as enchanting, mystical, and refreshingly original with deep roots in the Norwegian west-coast fjords where he grew up. Compared to Samuel Beckett, the 20th Century Irish poet and dramatist, his writings give voice to the unsavable birth, life. death, faith, and all other elemental subjects. Well known throughout Europe, and translated into fifty languages, his volume of work includes over seventy novels, poems, essays, children's books, and theatre plays. But, only recently, has some of his work been translated into English.

Fosse was born in Haugesand in 1959, but grew up in Strandebarm, a one-time municipality in the former flyke of Hordeland, on Norway's southwest coast. His family, Quakers and Pietistic Lutherans, helped shape his lifelong spiritual views. He began writing at the age of twelve, but a near-death accident at age seven, would seriously influence his writing later in adulthood. Ironically, as a teenager, he ignored books and wanted to become a rock guitarist. In addition, he played the fiddle and spent his youth writing lyrics for musical compositions. During these years, he also became politically influenced by communism and anarchism.

Fosse attended college at the University of Bergen where he studied comparative literature. It was there that he began to develop his distinctive writing style. He began writing in Nynorsk, the dialect of rural western Norway, rather than Bokmal, Norway's more popularly spoken language. In his first novel. Red Black (1983), he ignored writing about the conventional themes of social realism, so popular at that time, in Norway. Instead, he emphasizes the use of linguistic expression rather than a plot. This was followed by his second novel, Closed Guitar (1985) and a poetic cycle Angel with Water in Eyes (1986). In 1987, Fosse graduated from the University of Bergen with a master's degree in comparative



literature. The same year, he published his third novel, Blood the Stone Is.

Following a separation from his first wife Biørg Sissel in 1989, he published another novel and a series of essays. He continued to write novels through the early 1990's, and completed a number of translations with his second wife, Grethe Fatima Syed.

Fosse's first play, And We'll Never Be Parted, was written in 1994. Over the years, he has written over thirty plays, including The Name, Winter, and A Summer's Day. After Henrik Ibsen, he is the most accomplished Norwegian playwright. His plays are considered a modern continuation of the tradition that Ibsen began in the 19th century.

Since 1992. Jon Fosse has received 25 awards, including the Order National du Merit from France and the keys to *Grotten*, an honorary residence located next to the Royal Palace in Oslo's city center. This honor was bestowed on Fosse by the King of Norway for his contributions to Norwegian art and culture. He was nominated ten times for the Nobel Prize before he finally received it. The Nobel prize comes with an 18carat gold medal, a diploma, and 11 million Swedish kroner.
