

Tuesday, September 10 New Land, New Life

It feels like summer, but we are planning for the return of our monthly lodge meetings in September. Here is a sneak peak at our next meeting.

More than a decade ago, the Synnøve-Nordkap Lodge 1-008 developed a museum-quality exhibit telling the story of Norwegian Immigration to Minnesota between 1825 and 1925. After a successful showing at the Landmark Center in St. Paul, the exhibit traveled to numerous communities around the state and upper Midwest. Now, the exhibit has been refreshed with new banners featuring the same great content as the original, but in a more visually appealing and more easily transportable format. As we approach the bicentennial of the arrival of the first Norwegian immigrant ship, the Restoration, the "New Land, New Life" exhibit is ready and available for use in our communities. Speaker Lowell Johnson will describe the development of the original exhibit, the goals of the exhibit, a video presentation of its content, and how Synnøve-Nordkap will make the exhibit available for use by others." Lowell is a member and past president of the Synnøve-Nordkap Lodge in St. Paul, MN. After a 36-year career of public service with the Washington Co. Department of Public Health and Environment, retiring in 2021, he now spends time with grandchildren, volunteering, playing music, attending baseball games, traveling, and woodworking. Lowell and his wife live in Oakdale

The Viking Longhouse

Even though the modern-day image of Viking raiders looting their way across Europe has some historical validity, in truth, most Scandinavians of the that period lived a mundane, rural existence in small villages that were the focal point of a number of large surrounding farms.

The heart of every farm was the longhouse. The size of the house would vary depending on the wealth its owner and the number of inhabitants living in it. It could range in width from 15-25 feet, in length from 50-250 feet, and could accommodate 30-50 family members. It was built to house all living generations of a family, plus any slaves or livestock the family owned. Houses built on farms were larger than those built in towns. Whatever the size, the image and basic construction remained the same. Whether by accident or by design, it often looked like an upside-down ship.

The materials used to build the longhouse also varied, depending on where in Scandinavia it was built. Houses built in Denmark used oaks from deciduous forests for the framing. In Norway and Sweden, where oaks were scarcer, wood from coniferous forest was used instead. The walls were either built from wood or peat. In Denmark woven, wooden racks of stripped hazelwood and willow branches were created, then placed tightly between the vertical posts. Afterwards they were covered with a mixture of clay and dung to fill the open spaces. In Iceland and Greenland, blocks of peat replaced wood for walls. Two rows of high posts supported the roof and ran down the entire length of the building. Roofing was made of thatch, peat, or wooden shingles.

A front entrance gave access to the inside of the house which was divided into three areas. The largest was the central hall and the family's living space. A smaller area at one end, usually partitioned off, was the stable where the livestock was kept. The other end was an area often used for artisan pursuits like weaving, sewing, and crafting. The floor throughout was pounded-down dirt. The main room was where all normal activity

took place. Built-in benches lined the sides of the room and surrounded the center hearth. These benches provided support for the walls as well as platforms for sleeping. Other items in the room likely included storage chests, stools or chairs, and straw or large animal hides for a proper night's sleep. The hearth was the hub of the house. It was where all the cooking took place. Since there were no windows inside, it provided all the light and warmth for the house. Additional light was often provided by softwood torches, or ceramic or stone lamps fueled by fish, seal, or whale oil. The hearth was also where everyone gathered to sit and talk and share stories.

Since there was no chimney in the longhouse, a hole was usually carved out of the roof above the hearth for smoke to escape. However, with no windows, the room still remained quite smokey. Even so, the house usually remained guite cozy, and the longhouse was considered a sophisticated dwelling for its time.

At Borg on the Lofoten Island of Vestvågøy. stands a large Viking longhouse that was rebuilt from the ruins that were discovered by archeologists in 1985. Dated from AD 500, It is believed to once be the home of a local chieftain. Now the site has been turned into a museum and is opened to the public, where visitors can see for themselves how some Vikings of that period lived on a day-to-day basis.
