

### **Norway and NATO**

With the end of WWII and the beginning of the Cold War, Norway no longer believed that total neutrality was possible as a defense against aggression from outside. Its shift away from their long-standing neutrality policy had begun as early as December of 1940, only to be violated four months later by German occupation. In 1944, then Russian Foreign Minister, Vlacheslav Molotov, demanded that the Svalbard Treaty be revised so that Bear Island, the southernmost island on the archipelago, could be ceded to Russia. At wars-end, they faced a new threat on their

200-kilometer shared border with the Soviet Union. Right on their doorstep, the Kola peninsula, a large Russian naval and air base had been built. Still, they believed that they had strong support from both the United States and Great Britain, who did not want Norway falling under communist domination during the Cold War.

One option, proposed

by Sweden, was the creation of a defense pact between Norway, Sweden, and Denmark that would establish a neutral buffer between the two new emerging super powers. After a failed attempt in the 1930s and then again in 1942, the plan re-emerged in 1948. But after several meetings between the three countries, it was tabled because it was considered to be too weak to go against stronger soviet aggression. Counter to Sweden, Norwegian politicians including Trygve Lie and Halvard Lange, believed that this proposed option could only work with military support from the United States and other western European allies.

Stunned when the Soviet Union overran Czechoslovakia, Finland signed a Friendship Agreement with Russia. Norway

decided instead to go with a stronger defense plan. They, along with Denmark and Iceland, became founding members of NATO in 1949. the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. The threat of Soviet hostilities with the West was very real during the Cold War. For Norway, the only NATO country that bordered Russia, it required a real balancing act. To appease its neighbor, Norway did not allow foreign bases or troops on their territory during peacetime. It also would not allow nuclear weapons to be stockpiled on its land or in any of its ports. In 1953, NATO intelligence sources discovered signs of a possible Soviet campaign that could be targeting both Norway and Denmark. In the 1960s, there were real concerns brought on by

> the movement of Soviet Northern Fleet nuclear submarines through the Greenland-Iceland-United Kingdom Gap above northern Norway causing NATO strategists to rethink their maritime planning.

Throughout the cold war, from 1951-1994, NATO's headquarters, Allied Forces Northern

Europe (AFNORTH), was situated at Kolsås, a high hill outside Oslo. Its main responsibility was defending NATO's northern flank:
Denmark, Northern Germany, and the strategic Baltic Approach. Because of its unique terrain, Norway was often asked to host NATO training exercises. After the closing of AFNORTH in 1994, Kolsås remained open and is the home of NATO's System Support Center. Today Norway continues to be an active NATO member and was a participant in military operations in the Balkans, Afghanistan, the Gulf of Aden, and against ISIS.
